Paul received his MPH from Stony Brook University and after working as a product and sales analyst at the Solo brand of the United States Luggage Company, is looking forward to using his health data analytics skills.</p> <p>Kim Whitehead has been promoted to Manager of Communications and Operations. In her new role, she will continue to oversee all marketing/communications activities connected to the grant, and will now also ensure that the day-to-day operations of grant activities proceed as scheduled.</p> <p>Pascale Fils-Aime has been promoted to Community Health Coordinator. She will now oversee several PHIP programs, and we will look to her experience in community health to help us better service Long Island Health Collaborative participants and to expand into other areas of programming.</p>

<p><b>Look Backs</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Food Cluster</li> <li>• CCHL + LGBTQ Module</li> <li>• Library Asset Mapping Project</li> <li>• Other Grants</li> <li>• Data Output</li> </ul>	<p><b>Food Cluster</b> – The logic model for this cluster’s activities has been completed. The process of developing a collective data dashboard for the group’s activities is underway. We will be reconvening the cluster shortly to work on goal setting.</p> <p><b>CCHL</b> – 2018 is the second full year of the <a href="#">Cultural Competency Health Literacy</a> Train-the-Trainer program. The program is in a constant state of improvement due to a steady stream of participant feedback. In 2018, 342 service providers participated in the program, bringing our total number up persons trained in either the staff training or Master Facilitator training to 1,550.</p> <p><b>LGBTQ Module</b> – The LGBTQ Consortium has finalized their training curriculum, and members are currently holding their required sessions. Similar to the CCHL Program, an evaluation plan is in place, data from which will be collected and analyzed in the beginning of Q1 2019.</p> <p><b>Library Asset Mapping Project</b> – Dr. Lisa Benz Scott of Stony Brook University and Pascale Fils-Aime have worked to interview 14 libraries in Suffolk County using IRB approved tools to demonstrate libraries’ impact on their communities. There is a strong correlation with town demographics and type of programming offered (i.e., low needs/high resources = enrichment programming versus high needs/low resources = social service programming). The research has found an increasing number of libraries focus on programming and aiding patrons, in addition to their book rental services. These findings and the subsequent report will be distributed to libraries to aid in applying for grants, demonstrating value to the community, etc. In Q1 of 2019, we hope to share with the committee the other components of the library</p>

<p><b>Look Forwards</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Chronic Disease Self-Management Program</li> <li>• CCHL</li> <li>• Community Health Assessment Survey</li> <li>• Focus Groups</li> </ul>	<p><b>CDSMP Program</b> – QTAC, who held the umbrella license for this program, is dissolving on December 31, 2018. We are working together with experts in the region on how to apply for a license to aid in hosting or training new peer leaders for the programs.</p> <p><b>CCHL</b> – Suffolk Care Collaborative will be hosting the first <a href="#">CCHL TTT session</a> of 2019 on January 29<sup>th</sup>! A <a href="#">3rd refresher event</a>, where master facilitators are invited to give feedback on the CCHL program, will take place on January 14<sup>th</sup>, 2019. Also, an evaluation report for the CCHL program is currently in draft form.</p> <p><b>Community Health Assessment Survey</b> – We have finished inputting 2018 surveys, which were due by December 15. Paul will begin analyzing the collected data by January 2019.</p>

	<p>Findings will be distributed to members.</p> <p><b>Focus Groups &amp; CBO Key Informant Interviews</b> – All of the disclosure statements, screeners and interview guides have been approved by the planning committee and are ready for use. EurekaFacts has begun the recruitment for the Focus Groups which are slotted to begin January 7th. The four locations secured for the Focus Groups include the Brentwood Library, Riverhead Free Library, Elmont Memorial Library and Hempstead Library. Both projects will be complete by mid-January and then a full summary report for each part.</p>
<p><b>LGBTQ Health, an awareness-raising training</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>presented by Mila Madison &amp; Mena Falco, Transgender Resource Center of Long Island</li> </ul>	<p>Since October, 264 service provider in various clinical and academic roles have been trained on implicit bias, vocabulary, health disparities, and best practices by our 6 LGBTQ Consortium Members (LGBT Network, Pride for Youth, Transgender Resource Center, Stony Brook Center for Public Health Education, Anthony Santella from Hofstra University, and PULSE Center for Patient Safety Education and Advocacy).
