<p>Welcome & Introductions</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Member program descriptions for attending legislators 	<p>Janine Logan, Nassau-Suffolk Hospital Council/Long Island Health Collaborative, welcomes collaborative members and legislators to the August Long Island Health Collaborative Meeting. All members introduce themselves; 34 members are in attendance today, along with two New York State legislators.</p> <p>Legislators restored funding to the statewide PHIP program in this year's state budget and were on hand to see how the Long Island PHIP, known as the Long Island Health Collaborative, is coordinating population health activities for this region. Each legislator introduced themselves, the committees that they sit on, and which districts they serve.</p> <p>As each member introduced themselves, they had the opportunity to give a brief summary of their organization's mission, and showcase their efforts and successes to the senators and assemblymen.</p>
<p>PHIP Refresher</p>	<p>Funded by the New York State grant, the Population Health Improvement Program, the Long Island Health Collaborative is a data resource organizer and analyzer, the core of population health coordination, and a connection to constituents.</p> <p>Through solutions-oriented approaches, we serve to follow the collective impact model, leverage diverse partners, foster linkages, promote VBP concept, eliminate redundancies, streamline practices, and aggregate data.</p>

	<p>Guided by the state’s Prevention Agenda, the data work group unanimously chose two priorities for the Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA):</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Reducing incidence of chronic disease • Tackling mental health issues and substance use issues <p>The LIHC’s current initiatives are as follows:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Long Island “Healthy Libraries” • Walk With a Doc • Long Island Community Health Assessment Survey • Are You Ready, Feet?
<p>Long Island Greenway <i>Presented by Carter Strickland, New Jersey and New York State Director, The Trust for Public Land</i> Carter.strickland@tpl.org</p>	<p>In 2017, Governor Cuomo announced the Empire State Trail, a continuous 750-mile route slated to become the longest multi-use trail in the country. It will span the state from Plattsburgh and Buffalo to New York City. But it ends in Manhattan—leaving out the 7.8 million New Yorkers who live east of the city. The Trust for Public Land has a plan to change that by creating a historic trail that will connect the residents of Long Island (including Brooklyn and Queens) to the Empire State Trail.</p> <p>Blazing a new path through the length of Nassau and Suffolk counties might seem like an impossible task that will require major construction, but the work has been done for us by power companies. Utility corridors owned by a public authority already exist to deliver power to the residents of Long Island, and these wide, clear pathways offer a simple solution to building an off-road trail.</p>

	<p>Building on existing local plans and trails, and working with a team of more than 170 stakeholder groups, we're leading the development of the Long Island Greenway and mobilizing support for our plan. Our goal is to help residents to achieve their local vision.</p> <p>This trail will enhance Long Island's future by:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Attracting and retaining young professionals with amenities comparable with any major city and by solidifying the strong "sense of place" across the Island • Revitalizing downtown areas with walkable communities and affordable multifamily housing • Modernizing and leveraging the LIRR with other transportation modes, and diverting car trips to transit • Connecting more Long Island neighborhoods to coastal areas and parks with a network of accessible walking and biking trails • Fixing pedestrian and bicyclist fatalities, which are significantly higher than in the rest of the State
<p>Recognition from NYS Legislators</p>	<p>Senator John Flanagan addresses the collaborative. He congratulates all members of the collaborative on their successes, and thanks them for their tireless efforts in creating a healthier Long Island. As a lifetime resident of Long Island, Senator Flanagan expresses his pride for the successful health systems such as Catholic Health Services, Northwell Health, and Stony Brook Medicine.</p> <p>Assemblyman Fred Thiele agrees with Senator Flanagan's statement, and goes on to describe how important attending meetings such as these are for him. As a politician, he states, their main job is to do all of the talking. But he expresses how important it is</p>

	to sit back and listen in on the successes of the attending health systems, CBOs, FQHCs, insurance groups, etc.
